Bookworm completes another year of supporting the vision of the organisation, to inspire and nurture a love for reading in every girl and boy.

We are confident that the work on the ground nurtures humane engagement and is held to the highest standards by the Bookworm team.

In the year 2018–19, the library and office moved to a historic building in the Old Quarter of Panjim leased from the Mushtifund Saunstha and has opened a collaboration we hope continues for many years to come. The LiS programme stretched itself to reach 16 schools with a direct intervention service, reading stories to children every week across Goa, supported in part by the Cipla Foundation. The MOP continued to provide a community library service to children in three locations.

We are proud to have enabled the opening of a Community Library in the village of Aldona, under our Alban Couto Library Fund through Dr Mrs Maria Aurora Couto and to have continued to provide professional development courses through the LEC supported by Tata Trusts. We welcomed a new partnership with the Wipro Foundation to spread library training and book joy to more partners across India.

The vision of Bookworm to collaborate and nurture library work was kept alive in the online journal Torchlight, and the new visual arts project Nhoi - The Goa River Draw.

All of this is possible because of the larger community that support Bookworm and look upon her as an institution of pride. We are honored to shadow this work and thank you for supporting our organisation. We urge you to read the report and write to us with feedback and comments so that we may grow stronger.

The Library holds a curated collection of around 25,000 books, aiming to provide a rich reading resource to children of all ages & abilities. As a resource centre, it holds workshops & events through the year, reinforcing the idea of the library as an open & creative space for all.

The Libraries in Schools (LiS) programme carries forward the organisation vision through weekly library sessions facilitated in selected schools for the entire academic year, with the goal of setting up libraries in under-resourced schools.





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




BIG SHIFTS

NEW LIBRARY Alban Couto Community Library



The Alban Couto Community Library opened in August 2018 with the imagination of having a library space in the village of Aldona, inclusive and open to anyone who would like to access a good collection of books. The library holds a collection of 600 books, which is added to from time to time. Different workshops held in the library attract a number of members and non members to this community space.

Cacra






Chimbel

GOING PUBLIC Nhoi: The Goa River Draw

Aproject that documented the River through drawing & stories in a set of 13 mural panels on paper, the Nhoi storyboard, and audio visual documentation. Over 500 people, aged 3 to 93, from 12 communities took part in a series of on-site village workshops to draw 'their' river (River Mandovi/ Mhadei) and explore all that it meant to them through image making, story telling, reminiscence and reflection. The result is a deep and personal reflection on the River's importance – as a means of survival, and as a repository of communal memory.

Serendipity

Bookworm exhibited a small sample of the Nhoi project in December 2018 as part of the Serendipity Arts Festival, a week-long celebration of the arts. The exhibition displayed two panels, images of the workshop process, the map of the participating communities, and a short film taken from personal interviews during the art sessions.

Reading in the Park, Chicalim

A Reading Corner, art, craft, games, book sale, spot prizes and Zumba were all part of this event, which was engaged in by children and adults who enjoyed the exposure to books and reading amidst the cosy April shade of Joggers Park.





Junior Herald

Bookworm was invited to hold a one-&-a-half-page coverage in Junior Herald, a weekly children's newspaper, on different themes and topics around books, reading and libraries.

One Planet One Street

As part of this event, which was about making roads more inclusive for the safety and benefit of all road users, the Bookworm team set up different reading activities and engagement around books, in a manner engaging to every road user.



Young GALF (Goa Arts and Literature Festival)

Bookworm hosted the Young GALF segment, themed "Child Rights", with sessions by Ganesh Saili, Paro Anand, Nina Sabnani, Easterine Kire, Naresh Fernandes, and Sumana Roy. 480 children from 7 schools participated in this event which was held at the International Centre Goa.

Stitching in the Park

An improvisational stitching project was started in May 2018 at the Garcia de Orta, Panjim Park. Participants gathered every Thursday to meet and stitch together, around the theme of "Birds in the Garden", learning and exploring new stitches & techniques in the process.



The Bookworm team was invited to set up a pop-up library corner at a small Diwali gathering at Gaspar Dias, Panjim. Books, lanterns, diyas, and lots of colour contributed to the festive nature of this public event.

Torchlight: A Journal of Libraries and Bookish Love

A multi-media journal that looks at the world through the lens of libraries and books. It is held together by a loose collective of library educators and book lovers dedicated to preserving the spirit of free thought and the intense pleasure present in the act of reading. CORE PRACTICES Strengthened further in '18-'19 Read Alouds

The focus of every library session at Bookworm is to share a love of reading with others, and one core way we attempt to share this joy is through a story "Read Aloud", comprising of three main components:

- A Pre-story: possibly a song, game, or a discussion that sets the context,
- The main Read Aloud of the story, and
- The Post-Story, which reinforces the central theme of the story.

This year, Bookworm has facilitated over 1550 Read Alouds, across programmes.














BOOK-BASED ACTIVITIES Book Talks

The practice of talking about a book that one has read and loved was initiated within the team and followed by sessions in our school, community, and library programmes. The idea was that the listeners would be introduced to a new book to read, and to the many wonderful books that are part of the collection. Over the years, with many Book Talks being modelled, listened to, and worked on, we developed a set of Book Talk parameters for each class, which help the children keep in mind core elements that should be included in a Book Talk. We hope that Book Talks will encourage more children and adults to share with others something about the books that they have read and loved.



Thematic Studies

Thematic studies involve exploring different selected themes within a larger collection. During the last thematic study, members of the team were each given a mini project that forced the participant to delve through the shelves and pages and words in search of a newer understanding of the theme or idea to which they had been introduced.



Book Discussions

One way in which we strengthen our own reading and critical analysis skills is through reading and group discussions. Book discussions form a compulsory professional development practice of all Bookworm team members. These book discussions enable us to look at and questions our own thoughts and perspectives and those of each other, as well as learn from the diversity implicit in both, the group and the collection.



Genre Studies

In order to explore our own understanding of different genres, the team has engaged in series of sessions designed to provoke our thoughts and engagement with the respective genre. Last year we had a series of poetry sessions facilitated by Sujata Noronha, that exposed us to the genre of poetry, in different ways.



DISPLAYS

Displays are one way in which certain books or themes from the collection are highlighted, in a way that is interactive and compels users to interact with the library space, the books and with each other. Displays form a core of our library practice across schools, communities, professional development programmes and the Library.







OPEN ACCESS

The Library is based on a foundation of open access. It is open to anyone who wishes to step in, browse, and spend time among the books. Membership and rental rates are nominal and the library atmosphere is open and encouraging to every user. Bookworm also believes in the concept of access to everyone, and is therefore very proactive in reaching out to children and adults across communities, especially to those who may not have had access to books otherwise. We believe that reading is not just an act, but an interaction, and a privilege. That "Reader" is not just a description, but an identity. And that sharing is not just a responsibility, but a learning, and an experience.








BOOKWORM'S BOOK STOP PROJECT

Bookworm's Book Stop project sets up small open libraries that are free and open to all, in public spaces. The idea is to put out a small collection of books that is accessible and open to anyone who wishes to borrow, read, return, or add to the collection. As of now, there are 5 Book Stops set up in different public spaces around Goa. The books in these Book Stops are replenished by Bookworm from time to time.

DIVERSE PROGRAMMES & KEY IDEAS THAT DRIVE OUR WORK

····Lap Time Baby Time:

An interactive programme for the age group of 0-2 years, where parents are encouraged to gather together with their babies for a session of song, rhythm, movement, and quiet looking time, among soft books, touch and feel, pop up, and other interactive story books.

···Preschool Morning:

Every Saturday, Bookworm holds a Preschool Morning session, where children from the age group of 2-6 years engage in different activities such as a story read aloud, word games, songs, individual craft, collaborative craft, a short movie, and theme based snacks that promote early literacy in a fun way.

···Kids Cook

For the age group of 5 upwards, Kids Cook engages children in the act of cooking and baking through a Read Aloud of a food themed story and an interactive cooking/mixing/baking component following this.

•Story Hours

Story Read Aloud's along with different creative extension activities are a regular feature of the Library calendar.

•Art & Craft Workshops:

Different art workshops that introduce a variety of art and craft techniques and activities, as well as other expressive art workshops including guided drawing workshops, and drawing diaries are conducted in the library from time to time.

••Literature Circles:

A series of classes on literature and language discussions using children and young adult texts, film and activities, around different themes.

·Poetry Workshops & Creative Writing workshops:

Workshops for the age group of 11-15 years, that encourage an engagement with poetry and with developing their creative writing skills.

••Author Interactions:

Conversations and dialogue with different authors around their own books and connected themes, are held in the library from time to time.

· · Poetry Appreciation Group:

A gathering of poetry enthusiasts who read together, discuss, share and critically analyse different poems.

····Play Reading Circle:

A meeting of Play enthusiasts who come together to read and discuss different selected play scripts.

····Art Classes for Adults:

Artist Liz Kemp, held a series of art classes for adults this year, with an introduction to drawing the human body, objects, and nature.

····Dialogues:

Complex issues require collective exploration, and Dialogues are one way in which this happens in the library. The Dialogue sessions most often revolve around current issues and events.

···Stitching:

Participants in the age group of 15-80 years, meet and stitch together, around a chosen theme and stitching project, interacting, learning and exploring new stitches and techniques in the process.

INVISIBLE WORK

Besides the core library practice that Bookworm engages in, with children & adults across the state & country, there is also the invisible work that forms the foundation upon which our practice is built.


① Finding the book	Each book in the library is carefully selected and chosen to add to the diversity of the collection, as well as to cater to children of all backgrounds and enable an introduction through stories to a wide range of themes.
② Ordering/Buying	The book is then ordered and bought from the respective publisher, bookshop, or website.
(3) Colour Coding	Each new arrival in the library is first read and categorised based on a broad age based colour coding system, where each age group corresponds to a different colour code.
(4) Barcoding	The book details are then entered into an online sheet and each book is issued a subsequent book number.
(5) Covering	The book is covered with a plastic sheet in preparation for much use in the hands of eager readers.
6 Shelving	Each book is then shelved, first in the "New Arrivals shelf", and subsequently in its respective library shelf. The shelving system in the library is based on a user friendly, organisation of books in a way that is easily accessible to each user.
⑦ Book Care	Books are regularly mended and re-covered and the collection maintained in a way that it can be used and enjoyed by every user.
8 Weeding out/ Decataloguing	Book are regularly weeded out and decatalogued based on their condition and their use.

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


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
