## Note from our Trustee

Yet another year has passed and once again we take pleasure in reporting happy stories from Bookworm. As we continue to engage with learners and educators alike, it is heartening to see the increase in numbers across all our centres; books, football, memberships and sessions conducted. The Mobile Outreach Program has grown across more sites and our Home Based Library program continues to reach special learners across the state. But what fills us with joy and pride is the Libraries in Hospital program which has furthered our commitment towards inclusion. In spite of all the odds, the team persisted and reading sessions are now held in the District Early Intervention Centre of the South Goa District Hospital once in a week.

We are extremely delighted that Bookworm has crossed the Zuari to establish its presence in South Goa. Our fourth centre opened in Seraulim in March this year and promises to engage with a community so far not present on Bookworm's radar. As the library steps into its 21st year, it is a proud showcase of two decades of unflinching belief in its vision and the tireless dedication of its team members. On behalf of all my fellow Trustees, I wish Bookworm continued success.

## The Library and Resource Centre

The Library program aims to foster a love for reading through a curated collection, dedicated facilitators and diverse and dynamic programming all year round. We now have 4 libraries, with our newest one in South Goa. Each is a dynamic space that welcomes all and builds a community of readers in a safe and creative environment.

In 2024-25 the library aimed to spark reading joy through book-focused programming across age groups. Author and illustrator visits gave our children opportunities to read deeper. The Reading Challenge sought to build reading stamina and joy among our readers in a low-risk, high engagement environment. The library hosted over 5500 children and held over 240 library sessions in the year, including many collaborations, exposure visits and inter-library meets among our library children.

- #1 The first Inter Library Summer Reading Challenge held this year celebrated the shared spirit of reading.

## Libraries in Schools Program

The Libraries in Schools (LIS) program promotes literacy and learning among new readers through carefully selected, age-appropriate books and storytelling.

Studies have shown that bridging the non-literate and literate worlds is best mediated through the pedagogy of storytelling and the human experience. This program aims to bring these two strong pedagogic practices together to strengthen learning, literacy and the human experience. It provides grade-appropriate reading resources to children who are first-generation school goers and uses the storytelling method to develop thinking and literacy skills.

This year, LIS successfully reached government and government-aided schools across Goa in Tiswadi, Ponda, Bardez, Mormugao, Pernem, Bicholim, and Salcete, focussing on enhancing browsing skills and book engagement through Read-Alouds and extension activities.

### Highlights

- #1 Teacher-Managed Libraries: Teachers manage libraries independently in 60 Government Primary Schools in Goa following years of direct service and training.
- #2 Bookworm-Managed Libraries: Highest number of book circulation ever, with 57941 books borrowed by students in one academic year.
- #3 Travelling Library Vans: Growing Travelling Library Vans enabled 30 schools to enjoy the service with a fortnight delivery & engagement service.

## Mobile Outreach Program

The Mobile Outreach Program (MOP) began in April 2011 with the idea of taking Bookworm beyond the walls of a library and into the heart of communities, reaching children who may otherwise have little or no access to books.

Over the years, MOP has grown into a vibrant umbrella program that connects children with stories and reading in ways that are personal, regular, and rooted through a three-fold approach that includes reading sessions and library activities in community sites, a mobile library collection that visits communities and schools, and libraries at Care Homes that enable library joy for children who live there. By meeting children where they are, MOP ensures that the joy of reading travels far and wide, sparking curiosity and a love for books in places where libraries may not exist.

In 2024, the Mobile Outreach Program came alive with exhibitions, creative sessions, and community connections. From the Reading Challenge and Christmas festivities to children exploring exhibitions, every event deepened their love for stories and play. Partnerships with Wipro, CSA, and LEC participants brought fresh energy through site visits and pop-up libraries, while exposure visits linked children to music, art, and new friendships. Across all sites, from kalam and seed explorations to cooking, crafts, and beach picnics, children experienced the library as a joyful space of discovery and learning.

### Highlights

- #1 The Timeless Calendar featuring anti caste movements and people has become a powerful core text for engagement.
- #2 Exposure visits to cultural and art spaces are strongly calendared in the program to enable learning from exposure.
- #3 Joy of engaging with new communities in the south of Goa are enabled through the extended Travelling Library service.

## Professional Development Program

Bookworm's Professional Development (ProD) program provides opportunities to experience the possibilities of library spaces and to develop one's own vision and practice for libraries. It includes courses, workshops, mentoring, resource creation and dissemination, and support to professionals who engage in library work with children.

This year the program's projects included the Library Mentoring and Support program with 10 organisations, supported by the HT Parekh Foundation, the introduction to Libraries workshop supported by the Wipro Foundation, the Libraries: Purpose & Practice workshop held in collaboration with Parivartan, Bihar, mentoring support to the librarians of 4 DPS schools through engagement with the Takshila Education Society, a Skills Training workshop, and monthly virtual Continuous Professional Development sessions on relevant library-based topics. A podcast that began during the lockdown was reinstated in 2024 bringing together the unique perspectives of library veterans Sujata Noronha and Usha Mukundan.

As a part of the team's professional development, team members from Bookworm participated in Counter-Narratives: A Workshop on Mental Health of Marginalised Communities: Perspectives from India organised by the Marivala Health Initiative, and a Conference on Early Childhood Care & Education offered by Pragati Shiksha Sanstha.

### Highlights

- #1 The 7th cohort of the TISS-certified Library Educators' Certificate course was offered to 28 participants from 11 states of India, in a self-sustaining model.
- #2 Stronger collaboration with the Central Tibetan Administration (CTA) was fostered through the offering of Reading Helpers, a training program designed to support reading in the library with 48 teachers from 37 various Tibetan (in exile) schools in India coming into Goa to learn and share.
- #3 New online course design Filling the Gap intended for radical library folk to enable more social justice in library practice opened for the Calendar year with 10+ participants.

## Home Based Library Program

The Home Based Library (HBL) program reaches out to children with diverse needs, many of whom do not have regular access to library services. A parent/caregiver's strength lies in knowing their child the best, while Bookworm's strengths lie in curating books and materials that are age and need specific. These two elements form a synergy in the Home Based Library program to ensure that it is the child who benefits the most.

Last year, specially curated play sets were delivered monthly to the homes of the children who are part of the HBL program including books, sensory play materials, and resources to support their overall growth. Over time, families began to integrate these play sets into their routines, with several parents sharing that reading has become a joyful and consistent part of their child's daily life. Books such as Brown Bear, Brown Bear, Purple Jojo, and Orange Pear Apple Bear quickly became favourites among the children.

### Highlights

- #1 Participating families attended an evening of fellowship and cross learning at Bookworm Library, Panjim.
- #2 Support of partner organisation Sethu enabled the program to disseminate the service to new families.
- #3 Support of partner school Lourdes Convent enabled students of the Life Skills Resource room to enjoy our library in Saligao with fun and purpose.

## Visual Arts Program

The Visual Arts Program (VAP) aims to provide opportunities for various communities to engage with the arts. This takes place through sessions at our library and resource centres, community sites and schools, and at public cultural events in Goa. Workshops for librarians, teachers and organisations are conducted to achieve a wider reach within communities. These professional modules are also held for the Bookworm team. The program also curates child-centric spaces for reading and creativity across different festivals in Goa.

This past year, VAP facilitated the Open Air Library at the Serendipity Arts Festival and opened the Voices of the River Project in different public libraries. Additionally, sessions were conducted with the Bookworm team to further the scope of visual arts within library sessions.

### Highlights

- #1 In December 2024, Bookworm set up an Open Air Library at the Serendipity Arts Festival and conducted various activities for children and adults over nine days.
- #2 As part of the Voices of the River Project, sessions were held at the Usgao, Collem and Volvoti public libraries. The sessions produced zines, habarums, postcards and art documenting local vegetation and wildlife.



## Burrow

Burrow, Bookworm's Bookstore started in 2012 with the goal of making high quality Indian children's books more accessible, not just as tools but also as windows to empathy, joy, and deeper understanding.

Burrow houses a collection of diverse, carefully curated books from Indian publishers on themes such as emotional wellbeing, inclusion and integration, and ecology and environment. These books portray lived experiences from different regions, ethnic communities, and class and caste groups, intended to provoke young readers to affirm the rich diversity of India.

### Highlights

- #1 A Burrow sale was held in collaboration with the Museum of Christian Art, Old Goa and the Aldona Institute, Aldona in April and May 2024 respectively.
- #2 Burrow collaborated with the Professional Development Program to enable access to books in regional languages among children living in different parts of the country.
- #3 Burrow expanded its collection to feature books by 43 Indian publishers.
